


News from Global Health Ministries

We continue to work at home with our partners and respond to their needs for supplies and credible information in this challenging time. We have sent COVID- 19 response kits or grants with PPE to several countries as funds have become available and/or in-country sourcing is found. Recently GHM began sponsoring local production of PPE kits in Tanzania to meet healthcare needs and generate income for those who have lost their jobs because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Although GHM's warehouse has been closed to volunteers since early March, **packing containers has hardly missed a beat**. This is certainly a tribute to ceaseless efforts and long hours by our staff and volunteers working from home. Three more miracles have kept the shipping ministry rolling amidst the "shutdown".

- 1. As the shutdown began, GHM's warehouse was full of inventory ready to ship. Staff alone could pack a container for Zimbabwe, because our supplies were ready after months of volunteer labor.
- 2. Next, as the shutdown occurred, two 53' truck-loads of donated supplies (including over 10,000 N95 masks) became available. Unlike most donations, these supplies came pre-sorted and ready to be shipped! We are shipping these to our partners by ship and air now.
- 3. In April, with many bare shelves in our warehouse, Madagascar requested 40 exam tables and furnishings for rural clinics. Miraculously, these became available during the shutdown at no cost to GHM! These filled much of a container shipment that have gone out.



WOW! Thank you to all who participated in the CROP Hunger Walk this May. Your walking, prayers and donations make a difference. Our local CROP Walk raised \$6,047.77. Twenty percent of the funds are donated to the Barnes County Food Pantry. The remaining eighty percent supports hunger ministries around the globe through church world service. They'll help people like Ismael and his neighbors in Dajabón, Dominican Republic who aren't getting enough to eat. They can't afford to buy fish and recent droughts have made it difficult to grow crops. Your CROP Hunger Walk supports the Fish Training Center where Ismael is learning about fish farming. When he completes the course, he'll be able to set up his own pond and train his neighbors on how to do the same. It's a guaranteed supply of affordable nutrition for his family!

Highlights from the June Congregation Council Meeting

The Council met via electronic (Zoom and phone) means for our June meeting.

Capital Campaign/Flat Room Project: The current balance in the Capital Campaign fund is \$21,677.50. This includes the \$10,000 from the Farm Fund. Mike Lentz reported the flat roof project is on schedule for July start.

COVID-19 & Resuming In-Person Gather-

ings: The Council adopted at COVID-19 Pandemic Plan related to church building use and worship. Values of consideration of others, simplicity, and adaptive leadership guided the formation of the document. Following the ND Smart Restart Guidelines, we are agreed that we are in phase 3 of our pandemic plan, allowing for small groups and in person worship to resume with physical distancing. The Council agreed to continue the 8:30 am worship service to be recorded for Facebook/YouTube and Radio and offer one in person worship service at 10:00 am, beginning on June 21. This is a fluid situation and the executive committee has authority to make changes in response.


Paycheck Protection Program: The PPP has been extended to 24 weeks to file to use the funds received. It is a loan and the amount remains the same, what we originally filed for, just longer time to utilize the funds. We expect to use our funds up by the end of July and will then work together to file for the \$35,000 loan forgiveness.

New Phone System: Along with internet upgrades, the Property Committee is getting quotes for a new phone system for the church.

Over the past weeks, racism, white supremacy, and systems of injustice have once again come to the forefront of our national and theological dialogues. For too long we have ignored these issues within the church for lots of reasons – they're too political, too difficult, too hard to hear...

As Our Savior's, our mission as God's people is one that calls us to grow in faith constantly, sometimes by stepping out of our comfort zones and our world view into the wide welcome that God has in mind for this world. In the coming months, we hope to do some of that hard work together.

This month, you are invited to read and reflect on Pr. Lenny Duncan's book, Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S (see the bio below). Call the church office to reserve your free copy of Dear Church to read throughout July. Then, on a date to be named in August, join in conversation with your church community and pastors about the book, our faith, and our calling to embody God's vision for this world.

Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S: Lenny Duncan is the unlikeliest of pastors. Formerly incarcerated and homeless, he is now a black preacher in the whitest denomination in the United States: The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Shifting demographics and shrinking congregations make the all headlines, but Duncan sees something else at work—drawing a direct line between the church's lack of diversity and the church's lack of vitality. The problems the ELCA faces are theological, not sociological. But so are the answers. Part manifesto, part confession, and all love letter, Dear Church offers a bold new vision for the future of his denomination and the broader mainline Christian community of faith. Dear Church rejects the narrative of 'church decline' and calls everyone—leaders and laity alike—to the front lines of the church's renewal through racial equality and justice. It is time for the church to rise up, dust itself off, and take on forces of this world that act against God: whiteness, misogyny, nationalism, homophobia, and economic injustice. Duncan gives a blueprint for the way forward and urges us to follow in the revolutionary path of Jesus.

Return to Worship Guidelines

As we return to worship in in-person formats this coming month, we are thankful for your church leadership who have done hard, thoughtful work on how to make our time together as safe as it can be. As we begin to come together in groups and in community again, we encourage you to abide by these guidelines as we continue to care for our neighbors near and far. We are grateful for the patience and grace you have shown through this process.

This represents our leadership's best attempt to guide our way back to communal gathering in the building, and we will relax these guidelines gradually even as we continue to monitor public health statements and are aware of the possibility that, in the case that new waves of infections emerge, we may have to tighten the restrictions again.

- If you are at high risk of severe infection, vulnerable, or if you have a temperature and flu-like symptoms, you are encouraged to stay home.
 - We will continue to offer Facebook Live worship at 8:30 a.m., along with our broadcast on KOVC 1490 AM/96.3 FM at 11:00 a.m. for those who are not able or comfortable, for whatever reason, to gather in person.
- We encourage good hand hygiene, washing often for at least 20 seconds, and we will make hand sanitizer available at several locations.
- We encourage face coverings, though we do not require them at this point, recognizing that they are especially helpful for moments when social distancing becomes difficult and are a way of caring for our neighbors.
- We will reduce risk of contamination by:
 - Not shaking hands or hugging during the sharing of the peace (a simple verbal greeting, wave, or bow is encouraged). We will also refrain from hugs and handshakes as we enter and leave the building, and yes, even in the parking lot.
 - Asking you to place your offering in offering plates at the entrance of the sanctuary
 - Pre-placing bulletins in the pews and asking you to sit where there are bulletins
 - Taking special sanitation measures when preparing and serving Holy Communion, including those involved wearing masks.
 - For the time being, we will refrain from communal singing. We will have the hymns played instrumentally or sung by a song leader, and invite the congregation to participate through prayerful listening and reflection.
- We will promote social distancing by:
 - Not waiting in receiving or greeting lines
 - Sitting in family groups spaced out by every other pew.
 - Reducing movement through the sanctuary during worship
- We will refrain from gathering for a coffee fellowship time on Sundays and other fellowship/food shared in the building
- We will follow these same guidelines for special services in the church as well, including funerals and weddings. Decisions on whether these services will be open to the public will be determined on an individual basis and in conversation with state and local guidelines.

Thank you for your flexibility in this and for being a community built on relationships of grace.

"People can plan what they want to do, but it is the Lord who guides their steps." - Proverbs 16:9

There are many things that I have bought throughout the course of my life that have been frivolous purchases. We have tried our best dear church, to go with the flow – to do our best with our current reality and create meaningful worship and prayerful opportunities for our church community. At times it has gone well, and at other times....not so much. And we thank each and every one of you for the grace and generosity with which you have navigated the past months.

With each day comes new possibilities and no matter how bad we want to, even our best laid plans can, and just might, go up in smoke. And so as we shift into yet another phase of worship and what it will look like, I ask that you remain gentle with us and with each other as we try to figure this whole thing out.

For July and August, it is our hope to offer several worship opportunities:

- Worship on Facebook Live at 8:30 a.m., uploaded to YouTube on Sunday afternoons, and broadcast
 on KOVC 1490 AM/96.3 FM at 11:00 a.m. This will be our primary mode of worship and will feel
 familiar to many of you. There will be a full liturgy and hymns, readings and a sermon. We are thankful
 for those who have sponsored ALL OF OUR radio broadcasts for this 2020 year. We value this gift of
 ministry so much and are close to having new internet capabilities that should fix (hopefully!) patchy
 and sometimes glitchy broadcasts. If this at home worship is working for you, we encourage you to use
 this as your worship opportunity.
- 2. Sundays at 10:00, we will gather in the sanctuary at church for those of you for whom worshipping at home, for whatever reason, is not working. This service will look and feel different than perhaps what we are used to, but will offer us a chance to worship in community, centered in prayer and scripture. Sunday July 5th and Sunday July 19th we will offer Holy Communion in a way that allows us to maintain social distance and respect physical boundaries. Holy Communion dates for Sunday worship in August will be announced later.
- Wednesdays July 8th and July 22nd at 6:30 p.m., we will offer outdoor worship with Holy Communion
 in Pastor Kyle's backyard (1305 Chautauqua Blvd.) Bring a lawn chair, spread out, and enjoy the sun
 and fresh air as we gather for a short service of prayer and sacrament. In the case of inclement
 weather, we will not gather for service.

As with all things these days, these dates and opportunities are subject to change. If there are changes, we will be sure to share the information widely. But in the meantime, we hope and pray that these opportunities might offer us a chance to step, slowly and safely, out of this forced hibernation. And when the plans change, because they will, we remember that God promises to be with us, even until the end of the age.
