

Notes From Your Treasurer

The Annual Meeting at the end of January was a great success! Your treasurer went home to implement the newly approved budget. But that was the least of her work for early February.

It's was time for me to work on our annual Congregational Stewardship Report, or at least the financial side of it. I start by gathering all the pages in our Annual Meeting Report for 2023 that have \$ signs any place. This financial stewardship report has basically three sections for me: Receipts, Assets, Disbursements. This is not just General Budget items, but every financial stewardship item that shows up in the Annual Meeting Report. My working spreadsheets show exactly what page I gathered each figure from. It takes time, patience, and a pencil with an eraser. And lots of coffee!!

January-February also seems to be the time when we receive our personal contribution reports from OSLC. We want you to check over your reports to be sure that your gifts have gone to the categories that you intended them to go to. Changes can be and have been made to accommodate your wishes.

I can think of three areas that all have the word missions in them which may be confusing. <u>Missionary</u> Sponsorship (usually the Missionary Calendar) is to help sponsor our missionaries, Willie and Anne Langdji in Central African Republic. Global Health <u>Missions</u> is to help support healthcare around the world. Finally, <u>Missions</u>, which funds are used more locally.

Another area that may cause some confusion is the phrase: Building Fund. OSLC has a building fund account (separate checking account) which is for repairs above and beyond, regular building maintenance. The apartment rent and Deferred Maintenance obligation in our general budget feed that account. You will be hearing of it being used this winter in reparation of the water damage to the parsonage. Then, of course, the Capital Campaign account, which many of us think of when we see the changes made in our church building. Right now, the Youth Room is being targeted and plans are in place for the kitchen area downstairs.

There are a few other areas that cause us to pick up the phone to confirm what or where a gift is meant to be dedicated to. OSLC surely appreciates your gifts and wants to be sure we honor your gift-giving decisions. Be as detailed as possible in your gifting.

Now, on the home front: My pet-infested household is surviving the curiosity of young kitten-cats. I still can't figure out why they want to paw down in the garbage disposal to retrieve egg shells or think a medicine dropper is a great toy! These two also help me paint.

We can't go over it... We can't go under it... We have to go through it.

You may recognize this refrain from the children's song "We're Going on a Lion Hunt." Every day for about two months this past fall, I had the privilege of singing this song on repeat as I drove one of our foster placements to day care. I was hoping that by now that I would forgotten the tune and lyrics, but it seems to permanently committed to memory, and from time to time will pop to the front of my brain, just as it did at about 4:30 this morning. As it turns out, the frustratingly catchy lyrics might just be the perfect reflection as we find ourselves in the midst of Lent and nearing Holy Week.

It is human nature to want to skip right to the good part, to the happy ending. (Insert the equally catchy lyric from the late, great Tom Petty here – "The waiting is the hardest part.") Lent is undeniably long – 40 days, not including Sundays – and it's meant to be. This time leading up to Easter Sunday functions as a prayerful, sometimes somber, reflective season that invites us to face the hard human realities of sin and death. The music shifts to a minor key and the church dresses in deep purples and blacks foreshadowing the tragic and violent ending of Jesus' life on Good Friday. Even as we have focused our worship and scripture this year on the book of Acts and the work of the Spirit, the road is still leading us to the cross on Calvary hill.

As convenient as it would be to skip over Lent entirely and jump to the flower-filled celebration of Easter, the hard realities of Lent are just as real as the obstacles on a lion hunt – we can't go over it...we can't go under it...we have to go through it.

The Rev. Dr. James D. Ross puts it this way: "We have to spend time deep in the horror of betrayal and false convictions. There is no resurrection without the brutality of the cross....We'd often rather avoid the challenge of Holy Week. We prefer to ignore Good Friday because it is just so hard, and it reminds us too much of the world's ugliness. It reminds us too much, perhaps, of our own role in the world's ugliness, whether intentional or by our passive inaction. But that pain is a necessary part of the journey."

It is from the brutal reality and pain of Jesus' journey to the cross and crucifixion that the true joy and hope of Easter emerges. As the hymn sings, "...death be now but never last!" (Death Be Never Last, ACS #1030).

At the Annual Meeting in January, the Council was tasked with setting the worship time starting April 7, when we move to a single worship service. After consultation with the Sunday School Superintendent, we agreed that, for the months of April and May, 2024, worship will be at 9:00, with Sunday School following at 10:00; coffee fellowship will be at 8:30. We will survey parents and congregants in May to help us understand how this plan works for everyone; the Council is open to making changes, depending on what we hear back from members.

In other actions, the Council also agreed to pledge \$1000 of Diversity Funds (from the Farm Fund) to partially support an LGBTQ+ speaker at VCSU in April, Taylor Brorby, the author of *Boys and Oil*. This book was our first DEI Book Study last year. The Council approved Jennifer Stainbrook's appointment to the Congregational Life Committee, designated Margaret Dahlberg as the Council Representative to the Foundation Board and discussed the continued need for additions to the Technology Committee.
