

Rohde's Reforming Report

Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand."...After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. — John 13:3-7, 12-14

In this season of Lent, we gather together not only on Sunday morning, but Wednesday evening. We gather with intentionality; to grieve, to confess, to give thanks. We grieve the things and the people we have lost. We grieve what we cannot have or experience, or the things we no longer have.

We gather, also, to confess. We confess our shortcomings; our failures. We confess our misunderstanding or misuse of who and what God has called us to be for the world. We confess our ignorance, our arrogance, our self-righteousness. We confess that we gather more often at tables that Jesus would want to turn over rather than at tables that invite and include the meek and overlooked of the world.

We gather to give thanks. We give thanks for the grace-filled gift that is Jesus the Christ. We give thanks not only for his redeeming death and resurrection, but for his teachings and examples of how we are to be reflections of Him for the world.

In the Gospel of John, as Jesus gathers with his disciples one last time before his crucifixion, he takes that opportunity to teach them how to serve one another and others. Jesus washes their feet, becoming a visible and tangible example of how they, and we, are to serve those around us. Jesus, their teacher, our Messiah, washes their feet and not the other way around. Jesus wipes away their uncleanliness, while also acknowledging that it is not their whole selves which are unclean. Jesus also washes away our uncleanliness, our sinfulness, leaving our righteousness through Christ to shine for the world. We are freed from our sinfulness in the baptism of Jesus' death on the cross and resurrection from the dead. This freedom is ours, not to hold onto selfishly, but to share with our neighbors in creation through service.






The Service and Sharing Committee is excited to share a variety of activities throughout the Lent season. Proceeds raised from these events will offset the cost of food insecurity in Valley City, primarily through paying off school lunch debts. Our goal as a congregation is to raise \$3,000 over the course of the Lent season, or \$500 per week.

Noisy Offering Update: As of March 18, we have raised \$1,265.61! We are half way through Lent, and almost half way to our goal amount of \$3,000. So keep those donations coming....and see which pastor will "earn" a pie in his face!Funds for this Challenge include proceeds from the Lenten Supper free will offering, the Pie sale (March 16), and weekly noisy offering donations in the kettles at the back of the church. Notes from your Treasurer\$\$

I'm writing this message on St. Patrick's Day. St. Patrick was a Christian missionary and bishop in Ireland in the fifth century. He was known at the "Apostle of Ireland." While we usually celebrate birthdays, for some reason, March 17, according to Irish legends, is the day that St. Patrick died. His original name was Maewyn Succat, so you could be celebrating Maewyn Succat Day, wear green, and eat Green Eggs and Ham for lunch. That doesn't sound quite right, does it?

Financially, we are working diligently to stay within our budget. We can only do that with the support of Our Savior's members. January's gifts amounted to \$17,000, while February's support was \$34,000. That sounds great, but looking at the planned expenses of \$367,000 for

2025, our monthly giving should be about \$30,500. Those numbers don't terrify me because I have faith that our great congregation that will help in every way possible.

I was recently asked if a gift could include several projects like missionary calendar, memorials, radio broadcast etc. It certainly can! Just be sure to indicate on the check or envelope, how you want your gift to be used. My request for you is that you always ask questions regarding the church finances.

Our general fund account shows a Thrivent gift that nobody had admitted to giving us. Please let Ann or me know who you are if you want to see that gift reflected in your contribution report. When we don't know who gifted us Thrivent money, it goes down as an unidentified gift.

The Capital Campaign projects left are basically finishing the kitchen and the youth room project. If you walk downstairs, smile as you see the kitchen's progress, and if you venture down some of the hallways, you will notice that the youth room has to be secured from the bottom up.

On the home front, the curious critters seem to have settled down. I'm no longer cleaning up tipped over plants and weird things from the floors—at least not as much as I had been doing. I just walked past my bedroom and three sets of eyes were watching to see if I was carrying any pet food. I think that means I'm on supper detail now.

The Church Council met on March 12, 2025. Each of the committees reported on their 2025 goals and activity over the past month.

The **Property Committee** is focused on organizing its work without a property manager; Bobby Koepplin is still handling the renovation work on the kitchen and youth room.

The **Technology Committee** reported significant problems with the computer used for streaming that has resulted in a number of glitches; they will bring a proposal for purchasing a new computer to the next meeting. Their committee goal for 2025 is a major revision to our church webpage.

The **Service and Sharing Committee** is hard at work on this year's goal – to raise \$3000 during Lent to offset some of the public school's hot lunch program debt.

The **Congregational Life Committee** is beginning plans for Graduation Recognition (described elsewhere in this newsletter); their goal is to plan a potluck celebration later this year when the Kitchen is ready for use.

The **Children and Youth Committee** is working on plans for 1st Communion and, later in the year, a Youth Sunday program to increase youth involvement in the church.

The Worship and Music Committee plans to increase worship engagement this year, and welcomes suggestions and support from the congregation as they explore various options.

The **Call Committee** presented their final draft of the Ministry Site Profile (their first step in our search for a new lead pastor). Council reviewed and approved the draft, and directed the chair of the committee and council president to upload and submit the profile to the Synod office for final approval from the Bishop. Once this is approved, the profile will be live and the search will have officially begun.

Council then reviewed the Personnel Manual and recommended revisions. Members asked that building and office hours be posted prominently on the doors, Facebook, and the website, so members have reliable ways of knowing when the church building is open.

Two items of interest that were discussed – the Serving Group Roster (currently being updated to include new folks and remove those who are no longer members), and a serious discussion about the viability of the Radio Broadcast. If you have thoughts or concerns about either of these issues, be sure to talk with someone on Council before April 9.
