President's Corner

At the Council meeting on December 11, Pr. Nicholas opened the meeting with a short meditation on the words of Thomas in John 11, regarding Jesus' decision to go to Bethany (near Jerusalem) during a time when the chief priests and elders were seeking to arrest Him. Thomas says, "Let us also go, that we may die with him." I've always thought this was crazy talk! But Pr. Nicholas pointed out that these words demonstrate both the faith and mission of a believer – to go where He leads, and to give our all to His service. As we begin a new chapter at OSLC, we must be like Thomas, willing to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit and give ourselves fully to the ministries set before us.

The business of the Council included the following points:
Adoption of a Parsonage Use Agreement (as recommended by the Property Committee) to outline the expectations of OSLC and the resident pastor.
Start of the Call Process, to include authorization of a congregational survey (included in this newsletter!) to help inform the work of the Call Commit-

Discussion of a request from the Nome/Fingal/
Kathryn Parish to contract for pastoral services.
This would include visitation, funerals, and two
Sunday services per month. The Council authorized the Executive Committee to develop a contract and work with the NFK Councils to establish a workable 6-month trial period, with the assent of Pr. Rich and Pr. Nicholas, beginning January 1, 2025.

Authorized Farm Fund distributions of \$124,000 (itemized elsewhere in this newsletter).


